- 4. What do you think of the information and/or language in the first sentence of paragraph6? What might that tell us about **the genre** of the text?
- 5. What do you think of the author's support? Is he mostly giving us statistics and numbers? Is he citing research? Is he just linking to other sources? Is he quoting authorities? Is he just making claims with no support? What does this tell us about the genre, audience, and purpose?
- 6. Here is the link to "<u>COVID-19 Is Making Our Food Waste Problem Even Worse</u>." Go to the site and look around. What is the name of the publication? What are the other articles about? Who do you think reads this publication on a regular basis? What type of information are they interested in? How old do you think the audience is? Why? What jobs do you think the audience might have?
